Robin nails retirement at Rowethorpe

Robin Johnson's earliest memories of woodwork stem back to his childhood, where he was kicked out of his class for being "too small and weak" to complete his tasks.

But that moment came full circle many years later when Robin found himself teaching woodwork at the prestigious Hale School for some 30 years.

As a sixth-generation carpenter on his father's side and a seventh-generation teacher on his mother's side, Robin was destined to bring the two together.

Drawing from his own experience with woodwork as a child, Robin was determined to teach his students in a more empowering way.

"It's very important in life to teach according to a student's age and physical abilities," he said.

"When I was teaching at Hale, I could control what was being taught. I wanted to build their confidence and their skills.

"As a result, Hale became the top school in Woodwork for five years running."

Having retired some 15 years ago, Robin's love of woodwork has never faltered.

From tinkering around in his home shed to joining local men's sheds, Robin continued to brandish the skills he had taught for most of his working life.

Moving into Juniper Rowethorpe's close-knit retirement living community in Bentley in mid-2022, word got around about Robin's talents, which led him to be invited to join the on-site residents' shed.

With the help of fellow Juniper Rowethorpe resident Bill Henshall, the pair worked together to clean up the shed and quickly garnered a reputation as the 'on-site' handymen that residents could go to help fix or restore their furniture.

He added that continuing his love of woodwork was key to keeping active and engaged at the age of 90.

"What I learnt very early in life is, when you retire, if you don't keep yourself busy and do what you love, you shorten your life," he said.

"So that's why I like to keep myself busy and active with woodwork."

Juniper resident Professor Lesley Cala awarded UWA

Renowned as a 'trailblazer' in radiology, a pioneering neuroradiologist, a women's rights advocate and an inspiring educator, Juniper Trinity resident Professor Lesley Cala has been recognised for her outstanding life achievements as a recipient of University of Western Australia's prestigious Chancellor's Medal.

Surrounded by friends and family, Professor Cala was presented the medal by UWA Chancellor Robert French AC during a ceremony held earlier this month at Juniper Rowethorpe's Sutton Community Centre in Bentley.

As one of only four women to graduate with a Bachelor of Medicine degree at UWA in 1964, Professor Cala returned to UWA as a tutor of anatomy and physiology, before relocating to the UK to undertake further medical training to complete a Diploma and Fellowship of the Faculty of Radiologists.

Having established herself as a leading expert in Neuroradiology, Professor Cala returned to Perth where she spent her subsequent years building an illustrious career that saw her work in many respected roles in radiology at Perth hospitals including Royal Perth, Sir Charles Gairdner and Princess Margaret Hospitals.

Among her most significant career milestones include procuring the first CT machine in the Southern Hemisphere for Perth in 1975, and producing a groundbreaking thesis which paved the way for better diagnosis and treatment options for patients.

Now a beloved resident at Juniper Trinity Residential Aged Care Home in Bentley since February 2023, Professor Cala is described by her fellow residents and staff as a vibrant and intelligent woman who is full of light, passion and wisdom.

On receiving the medal, Professor Cala,

84, said she was deeply humbled: "I'm overwhelmed, I really wasn't expecting this at all. I've been very fortunate in my life to have a career that I was very passionate about, so it didn't feel like work."

"Like many older Western Australians in our Juniper community, Professor Cala has contributed much to this State," Juniper CEO Russell Bricknell said. "Her groundbreaking medical work helped form the very foundation for better diagnosis and treatment for patients today.

"Today, Professor Cala continues her passion, pouring over medical journals and articles to keep up-to-date in her field, which helps her to prepare lessons for undergraduate medical students at UWA."

Administration office arrangements have changed and the feedback from residents and our own experience is very positive. The new recruits Jade Chin and Kaycee Chambers have settled in well under Tracey's guidance, so well done to all.

We are following the reticulation issue very closely. A 100 percent fix is just around the corner we are told, and the village should return to its former glory.

We can also report that funds have been allocated for a full renovation of the system in the next financial year.

We wish all our residents a Happy Christmas and a Healthy New Year.


We have been from pillar to post in a lot of different ways without getting lost (maybe once).
